• **2010-2011 Pell Grant CFL Reduction To NAPD Warning Message (01/27/11)**

At this time, the majority of Federal Pell Grant (Pell Grant) funds for the first payment period of the 2010-2011 Award Year should have been disbursed to students. In general, schools are to submit Pell Grant disbursements to the Department of Education (the Department) no later than 30 days after making an actual disbursement or becoming aware of the need to adjust a student's previously reported disbursement. Accordingly, the majority of disbursements for the first payment period of the 2010-2011 Award Year should have already been submitted to the COD System for processing.

2010-2011 Pell Grant CFL Reduction to NAPD Warning Message Sent on January 26, 2011

On January 26, 2011, Federal Student Aid sent a message to schools that have a Pell Grant Current Funding Level (CFL) for the 2010-2011 Award Year that is greater than their Net Accepted and Posted Disbursements (NAPD). The message warns an affected school that its 2010-2011 Pell Grant CFL will be reduced to the NAPD if the CFL is still greater than the NAPD on February 16, 2011. After the reduction, schools that have drawn down funds in G5 but that have not submitted the applicable disbursements to the COD System may be in an excess cash situation and must either return the funds to the Department of Education for the correct program/award year, or submit additional disbursement records to resolve the balance.

Federal Student Aid sent the January 26, 2011 warning message to an affected school's Student Aid Internet Gateway (SAIG) mailbox in the message class PGTX11OP. A school that received the warning message should review its internal records and submit all outstanding Pell Grant disbursements for the 2010-2011 Award Year to the COD System as soon as possible but before February 16, 2011.

Impact on COD Processing January 30, 2011 (01/26/11)

unavailable from 3:00 A.M. until 11:00 A.M. (ET) due to its regular Sunday morning maintenance. These activities will result in outages of certain COD System functionality for a period of time.

Extended COD System Maintenance

From 12:00 A.M. (ET) until 12:00 P.M. (ET) on Sunday, January 30, 2011—

- Users will not be able to submit or retrieve data via the [COD Web site](#).
- An individual will not be able to complete online Direct Loan Entrance Counseling, complete a new Master Promissory Note (MPN) electronically, complete a Direct PLUS Loan Request electronically, endorse a Direct PLUS Loan electronically or view loan correspondence via the [StudentLoans.gov Web site](#).
- An individual will not be able to complete TEACH Grant Initial and Subsequent Counseling, complete a new TEACH Grant Agreement to Serve (ATS), or retrieve an existing ATS via the [TEACH Grant Web site](#).
- Batches submitted by schools via the SAIG will be held or schools will receive an error message informing them that the SAIG is unavailable and that the data must be transmitted at a later time.

Sending Addresses for U.S. Territories and Foreign Countries on the Common Record or the COD Web site (01/28/11)

When submitting student or borrower addresses or address changes to the Common Origination and Disbursement (COD) System, it is important that the correct tags are used, particularly when the student or borrower address is located in a U.S. Territory or Foreign Country. If these addresses are not submitted correctly, important correspondence from the COD System and the federal loan servicers is delayed or not received.

- When a student or borrower address is located in a U.S. Territory it is considered a domestic address. Do not submit a Country Code.
- When a student or borrower address is located in a Foreign Country, it is treated as a foreign address.

See below for the correct procedures for submitting U.S. Territories and Foreign Country addresses via the Common Record batch submission or COD Web site.

Submitting Addresses for U.S. Territories and Foreign Countries via the Common Record



When creating or updating a person record via the Common Record batch submission, a school should send the address block with the following tags:

Submitting Addresses for U.S. Territories and Foreign Countries via the COD Web site

When creating or updating a person record on the COD Web site, a school should select the U.S. Territory from the dropdown box in the State/Province field. A school should select the Country field as “Blank”.
