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resolve on April 4, 2010. In addition, Federal Student Aid communicated its plan to enable three Web search components early this week. Subsequent to posting the announcement, Federal Student Aid made a decision to delay implementation of these non-critical fixes until this coming weekend.

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This Dear Colleague Letter provides the higher education community with a high-level description of two of the major federal student aid provisions of the recently enacted Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010 (HCERA), Pub. L. 111-152. These provisions impact the Federal Pell Grant (Pell Grant) Program and end the authority for lenders to make loans under the Federal Family Education Loan (FFEL) Program. Over the next weeks and months, the Department will provide the community with details on these provisions.

As explained in GEN-10-05, the legislation includes modification of the calculation for determining an individual's Pell Grant beginning with the 2010-2011 Award Year. The Department expects to post revised 2010-2011 Pell Grant Payment and Disbursement Schedules sometime this week. In addition, the Department is currently evaluating impact to its systems, software, and Web applications and will post operational implementation guidance and schedules once these plans are finalized.

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Release 2.0 adds Federal Pell Grant (Pell Grant), Teacher Education Assistance for College and Higher Education Grant (TEACH Grant), and William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan (Direct Loan) functionality for the 2010-2011 award cycle. The Pell Grant module includes 2010-2011 origination and disbursement functionality for the Academic Competitiveness Grant (ACG) and the National Science and Mathematics Access to Retain Talent Grant (National SMART Grant).

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Federal Student Aid takes this opportunity to remind the community of the availability of the COD Computer-Based Training (CBT). The COD CBT includes enhancements that have been made to the COD System, the [COD Web site](#), and associated Web sites and software products through June 27, 2009.

The COD CBT consists of component simulations and CBTs. Each COD CBT component is explained below. The electronic files associated with each component, as well as information about downloading and navigating the COD CBT, are available on the Information for Financial Aid Professionals (IFAP) Web site. Note: With the implementation of the [StudentLoans.gov Web site](#) at the end of March 2010, the three electronic Master Promissory Note (MPN) simulations no longer reflected the process for electronically completing Direct Loan MPNs and have been removed. We will post updated electronic MPN simulations when we next update the full version of the COD CBT.

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COD System Simulations – The COD System Simulations offer lessons that explain the [COD Web site](#) screens and functionality available to a school administrator. There are 14 lessons with text to guide a user through each area of the [COD Web site](#). By entering fictitious data, the user can explore basic navigation and functions of the [COD Web site](#) and practice locating and creating information in a safe environment that includes tips for assistance.

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TEACH Grant Web Site Simulation – The TEACH Grant Web site Simulation guides the user through the [TEACH Grant Web site](#) and includes a step-by-step walk through of the process for completing TEACH Grant counseling and completing a TEACH Grant Agreement to Serve (ATS).

Revised 2010-2011 Pell Grant Payment And Disbursement Schedules Posted On The IFAP Web Site (04/09/10)

Federal Student Aid has posted [Dear Colleague Letter P-10-03 on the Information for Financial Aid Professionals \(IFAP\) Web site](#). This letter provides *revised* Payment and Disbursement Schedules for determining Federal Pell Grant (Pell Grant) awards for the 2010-2011 Award Year for full-time, three-quarter-time, half-time, and less-than-half-time students. These revised schedules are required because of changes made by the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010.

Note: Federal Student Aid is currently evaluating impact to its systems, software, and Web applications and will post operational implementation guidance and schedules once these plans are finalized.

2009-2010 Verification Status Code “W” Warning Message (04/7/10)

On April 6, 2010, Federal Student Aid began processing a text message (PGTX10OP) as well as a Reconciliation Report (PGRC10OP) to schools that have one or more Federal Pell Grant (Pell Grant) student records still reported with a verification status code of “W”. The message is a warning that disbursements to all students with a verification status code of “W” will be considered overawards and reduced to a zero dollar amount (\$0.00), even though the disbursements were previously accepted in the COD System. The reduction of the affected disbursements is scheduled to occur on April 20, 2010.

Note Regarding Verification Deadline:

Some of the student records included in the Reconciliation Report may be for students who are still within the allowable timeframe for submitting verification documentation/completing the verification process as will be specified in a forthcoming “Notice of Deadline Dates for Receipt of Applications, Reports, and Other Records for the 2009-2010 Award Year.” This notice will be published in the [Federal Register](#) and subsequently posted on the [Information for Financial Aid Professionals \(IFAP\) Web site](#).

Following the April 20, 2010 reduction, if a school needs additional time to complete verification for an individual student in accordance with the allowable timeframe in the [Federal Register](#) notice, the school may resubmit a disbursement record with a value greater than zero (\$0.00) until September 30, 2010. After September 30, 2010, the COD System will no longer accept “W” as a valid verification status code for 2009-2010 Pell Grant awards.

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Live Internet Town Hall Meeting - Year-Round Pell Grant Q & A (03/29/10)

Federal Student Aid is pleased to announce a town hall meeting on implementation of the year-round Federal Pell Grant (Pell Grant) provision. This will be a live Internet broadcast during which we will present answers to common questions we have received and discuss issues raised by the community about implementation of the year-round Pell Grant provision.

The Higher Education Opportunity Act (the HEOA), Pub. L. 110-315, enacted on August 14, 2008, authorizes schools to disburse up to two Pell Grants in a single award year, beginning with the 2009-2010 Award Year, for Pell-eligible students. Final regulations related to this change to the Pell Grant Program were published in the Federal Register on [October 29, 2009](#).

Federal Student Aid staff will present this information in one 90-minute town hall meeting, with one version of the meeting designed for term-based schools and the other version designed for clock-hour/non-term schools. The town hall meeting is intended for all schools that participate in the Pell Grant Program.

2007-2008 National SMART Grant CFL Reduction To G5 Net Drawdown Warning Message (03/29/10)

At this time, all National Science and Mathematics Access to Retain Talent Grant (National SMART Grant) funds for the 2007-2008 Award Year should have been disbursed to students. In general, schools are to submit National SMART Grant disbursements to the Department of Education (the Department) no later than 30 days after making an actual disbursement or becoming aware of the need to adjust a student's previously reported disbursement. Accordingly, disbursements and disbursement adjustments for the 2007-2008 Award Year should



have already been submitted to the Common Origination and Disbursement (COD) System for processing.

2007-2008 CFL Reduction to G5 Net Drawdown Warning Message Sent on March 25, 2010

On March 25, 2010, Federal Student Aid sent a message to schools that have a G5 National SMART Grant authorization, known in the COD System as Current Funding Level (CFL), for the 2007-2008 Award Year that is greater than their Net Drawdown amount reflected in the COD System and in G5. The message warns an affected school that its 2007-2008 National SMART Grant CFL will be reduced to the G5 Net Drawdown if the CFL is still greater than the G5 Net Drawdown on April 28, 2010. When the actual reduction occurs on April 28th, the school will have a reduced authorization in G5 and will receive an Electronic Statement of Account (ESOA) that reflects the revised authorization.

Federal Student Aid sent the March 25, 2010 warning message to an affected school's Student Aid Internet Gateway (SAIG) mailbox in the message class SGTX08OP. A school that receives the warning message should review its internal records and its CFL, G5 Net Drawdown, and Net Accepted and Posted Disbursements (NAPD) reflected in the COD System as soon as possible. The school should submit all outstanding downward disbursement adjustments to the COD System and/or request any outstanding drawdown from G5 for the 2007-2008 Award Year as soon as possible but before April 28, 2010.

2007-2008 ACG CFL Reduction To G5 Net Drawdown Warning Message (03/12/10)

At this time, all Academic Competitiveness Grant (ACG) funds for the 2007-2008 Award Year should have been disbursed to students. In general, schools are to submit ACG disbursements to the Department of Education (the Department) no later than 30 days after making an actual disbursement or becoming aware of the need to adjust a student's previously reported disbursement. Accordingly, disbursements and disbursement adjustments for the 2007-2008 Award Year should have already been submitted to the Common Origination and Disbursement (COD) System for processing.

2007-2008 CFL Reduction to G5 Net Drawdown Warning Message Sent on March 11, 2010

On March 11, 2010, Federal Student Aid sent a message to schools that have a G5 ACG authorization, known in the COD System as Current Funding Level (CFL), for the 2007-2008 Award Year that is greater than their Net Drawdown amount reflected in the COD System and in G5. The message warns an affected school that its 2007-2008 ACG CFL will be reduced to the G5 Net Drawdown if the CFL is still greater than the G5 Net Drawdown on April 21, 2010. When the actual reduction occurs on April 21st, the school will have a reduced authorization in G5 and will receive an Electronic Statement of Account (ESOA) that reflects the revised authorization.

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
